

Welcome

When I was young, I was an avid reader of Enid Blyton's adventure stories from Secret Seven to the Famous Five. I loved the idea of the independence suggested.

The Secret Seven had rules and tasks, and everything was decided by children with no apparent adult involvement. They even got to light candles in their very own gang hut! Even though I never did come across spies sending signals out to sea, or track smugglers through underground tunnels, I lived in hope of a real adventure. Through the range of activities offered by Girlguiding Scotland, our members get to have adventures on a weekly basis, though maybe not quite as hair raising as those experienced by the Famous Five!

2012 was a year of adventure for Girlguiding Scotland. In addition to the adventures in Units and in Counties, two major events marked our year of adventure. For girls aged around 10, we held a weeklong transition camp, Together 2012, at Netherurd. Brownies and Guides travelled from all over Scotland and enjoyed a week of camping and a variety of activities based around a London theme and the Olympics.

The other big adventure was Adventure 2012. With the aid of funding from Cashback for Communities, a total of 10 days of outdoor activities were offered to Guides and Senior Section members throughout the summer. A total of 1,300 girls experienced abseiling, canoeing, caving, raft building, grass sledging, high ropes courses, archery, zip wires, water slides; the list could continue. These events were held across the country at Fairburn, Galloway, Lagganlia, Fordell Firs and Netherurd.

About Us

Girlguiding Scotland, with 59,182 members and recognised volunteers, is the largest voluntary organisation for girls and young women in Scotland.

More than 9,000 incredible volunteers in Scotland contribute a huge number of hours every year to enable Rainbows (aged 5 - 7), Brownies (aged 7 - 10), Guides (aged 10 - 14) and Senior Section (aged 14 - 25) to develop their potential, whatever their ability or background.

2012 has been a year filled with adventure and opportunities for girls and young women across Scotland. Our youngest members spent the year celebrating the Rainbows 25th birthday with parties in their Units and Counties. They also took part in the Rainbow Big Birthday Challenge which had lots of fun ideas to use in their Units while working through their programme, the Rainbow Jigsaw; Look, Learn, Laugh and Love.

Brownies, Guides and Senior Section took part in several large scale events including Adventure 2012, Together 2012 and their very own pop concert Tartan Gig 2012. We sent a total of 34 girls and 11 adults to Germany, Poland, Iceland and Ghana on International trips in 2012. Three Scottish girls went to Guyana through GOLD and four of our adults went as volunteers to the WAGGGS World Centre in Sangam.

Our Extending Guiding for Girls project ensured that we continued our work to keep guiding open to all girls. The aims of this project are to promote Girlguiding in ethnic minority communities and to provide support to our volunteers to enable them to make this happen. Girlguiding Scotland prepared training resources for volunteers, translated information about our opportunities, provided tips for reaching out to underrepresented communities and provided background information about the biggest ethnic minority groups in Scotland. This work resulted in girls and women from minority communities joining units at a local level.



"For our GOLD trip to Guyana last year we worked with Girlguiding Guyana girls and Leaders and held trainings at their Headquarters. The topics for trainings were environment, advocacy, active response, camp skills and badge training. The project was three weeks long and included four days camping away from the capital. I really think the girls benefited from the advocacy training, as they visibly grew in confidence and were able to talk about issues that affected them and their country.

"Personally, my Guyana trip has made me much more confident in myself and it has increased my desire to travel and explore further. I have improved my time and project management skills which are really useful in my Chemistry degree subject. I'm going back to Guyana this year as a Leader for the GOLD trip; a brilliant opportunity to meet lots of new people and take on more responsibility which is a challenge but one I think will help me develop lots of useful skills. All in all, it's been amazing!"



A total of 1,302 Guides and Senior Section members got a chance to try out activities including kayaking, mountain biking, abseiling, windsurfing, climbing and ropes courses amongst others. The five events took place at Fairburn Activity Centre (11 - 13 May), Galloway Activity Centre (15 - 17 July), Lagganlia, Inverness (15 - 17 July), Fordell Firs (20 - 22 July) and Netherurd (20 - 22 July).

Responses after the events, from both girls and parents clearly demonstrated that Adventure 2012 had successfully provided an opportunity for girls to challenge themselves within the safe environment provided by Girlguiding Scotland.

Girlguiding Scotland would like to take this opportunity to record our thanks to the Scottish Government and the Cashback for Communities Fund for their funding support for Adventure 2012, without which this amazing and hugely successful project would not have been possible.

96 Brownies and Guides attended Together 2012 at Netherurd in August.







Treasurer's Report 2012

Despite the wider economic background faced by every organisation this has been a very strong year in terms of financial progress and at the year end we saw a healthy increase in our general reserves.

The general operating budgeted surplus for the year was £39,000, while the actual surplus was £87,000. Many activities have performed better than anticipated, two particular examples being:

- Shops we budgeted for a surplus of £2,000 and, after allowing for additional costs of £37,000 primarily in respect of exceptional costs following the closure of Dundee and redundant stock write off, made a deficit of £3,000.
- Netherurd in recognition of the loss of formula funding and projected usage we budgeted for a deficit of £56,000 but due largely to effective management action the deficit was reduced to £26,000.

Our main source of income is through members' subscriptions, and these were up by almost £75,000 on 2011, £15,300 above budget, reflecting the increase in membership and the fact that the Scottish levy was increased from £8 to £9 per member.

Voluntary and general income figures were generally below 2011 levels with significant reductions in grants: the main reason being large CashBack and National Voluntary Organisations Support Fund awards, which were received in 2011, and legacy income. These were partly offset by the improved income levels at Netherurd.

This year saw a number of other minor additional costs, eg repairs at Coates Crescent, the launch of Easyfundraising, Join Us III training, increases in the cost of producing Blueprint and the annual report, which were offset by savings in staff costs and property insurance.
