This role

The compliance lead volunteer will advise and support counties with matters relating to volunteer compliance. This role is part of the county support team, which focuses on providing support to local guiding with concerns, complaints and compliance. The volunteer team is led by a deputy Scottish chief commissioner and supported administratively by staff from Girlguiding Scotland.

Your profile:

- Excellent verbal and written communication skills
- Ability to work confidentially and handle challenging conversations with diplomacy and sensitivity
- Good understanding of what is required by OSCR for charity compliance
- Problem solving skills including tenacity and diligence to follow a situation over an extended period of time
- Knowledge of Girlguiding policies and procedures pertaining to finance and compliance or a willingness to learn

What you'll do in this role

The lead volunteer for compliance should be able to commit to approximately 10-12 hours per month as well as attend four team meetings a year. You'll also:

- Advise and support commissioners when compliance matters are raised; these may include financial compliance matters as well as failure to complete mandatory trainings or follow the Girlguiding Code of Conduct
- Carry out or coordinate investigations and report writing following Girlguiding procedures and good practice
- Assist with the induction, informal training and support of commissioners as required
- Provide support for interacting with Girlguiding or with external agencies where appropriate
- Engage proactively as a member of the team, identify emerging trends and issues across Girlguiding Scotland

What you'll get from this role

- The role will help make a difference to the lives of girls all over Scotland by supporting leaders and commissioners to follow current Girlguiding policies and procedures
- Providing this behind-the-scenes support will upskill local commissioners to enable them to feel confident in supporting their leaders when concerns arise



- You will be part of a small friendly team of volunteers and staff members who are passionate and committed to supporting guiding
- You will have the opportunity to develop transferrable skills in leadership, team working, problem solving and communication
- You will build skills in supporting and advising on how to resolve compliance concerns in the voluntary sector
