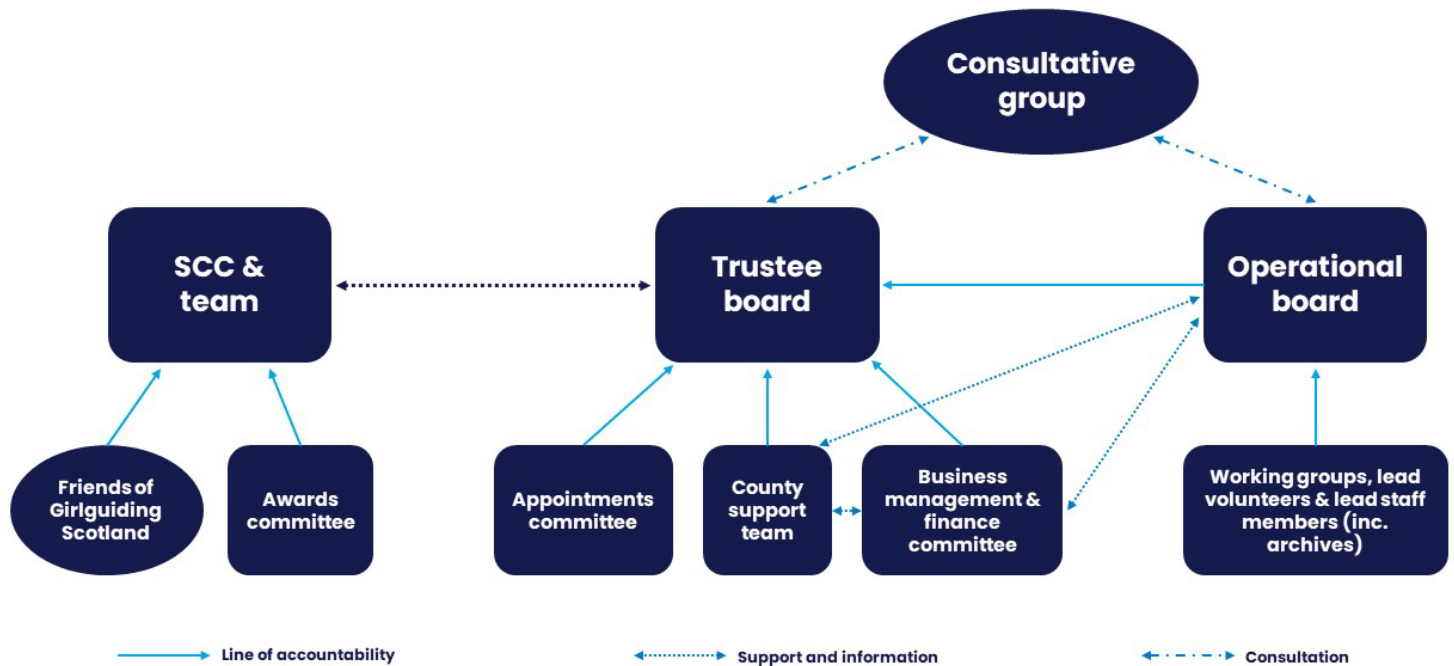

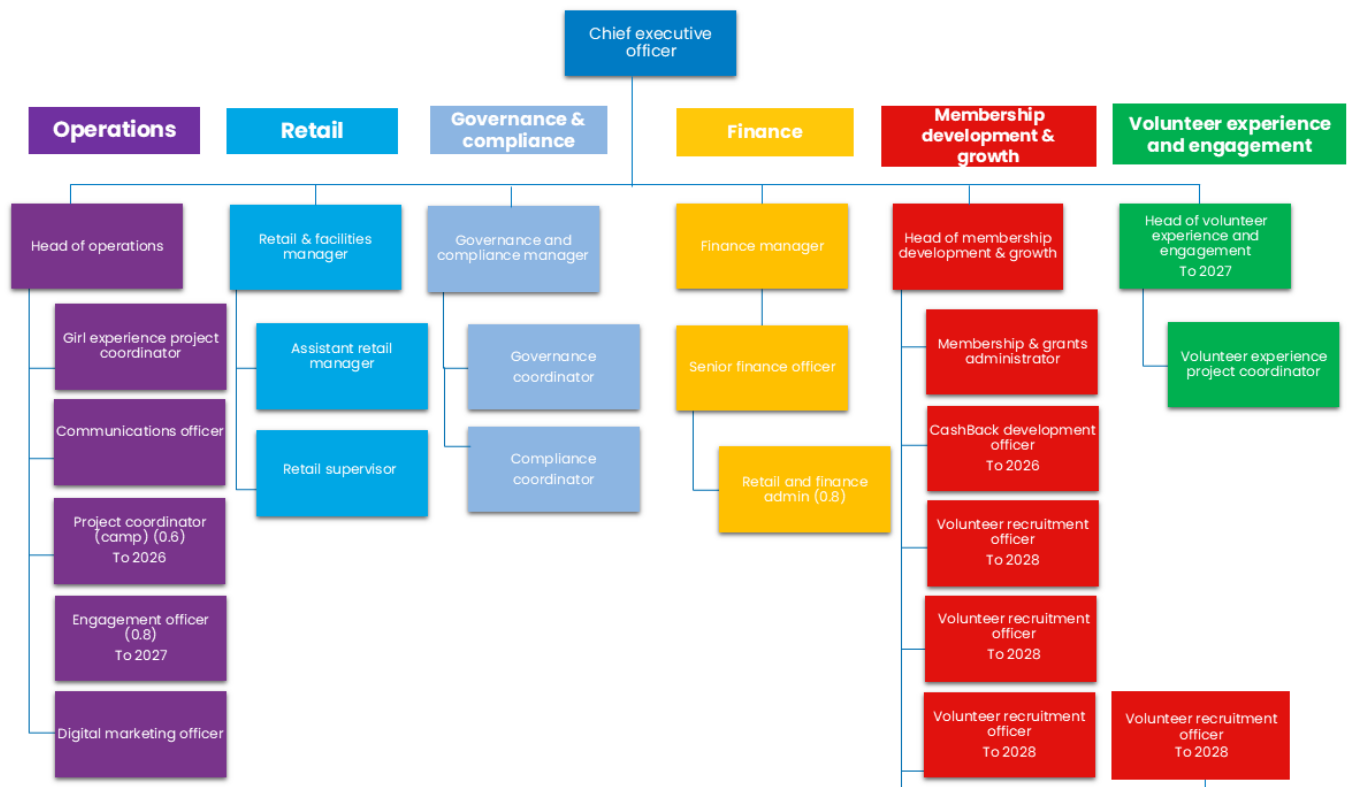

The role

Are you looking for a new volunteer role? Are you passionate and knowledgeable about communications and PR and want to help support our network of county communication and PR advisors (PRAs) across Scotland?

1.0 The purpose of the role

As the PRA network coordinator you will work to support and advise our PRAs on county communications, PR and social media. You will keep up to date with events and collaboration opportunities between counties and Scottish level.

You'll be working closely with staff in the operations team, including the digital marketing officer and the communications officer, to enthusiastically promote Girlguiding Scotland. You'll report to Eleanor, lead volunteer for membership engagement and communications.

1.1 Role and responsibilities

The expected time commitment for this role is on average 15 hours a month.

The role is for 3 years and can be extended for up to 2 years by mutual agreement. We can offer flexibility around the length of term – we realise some people may not wish to commit to taking on a role for a period of 3 years.

In partnership with staff, you'll be responsible for:

- Chairing and promoting a non-judgmental network of PRAs across counties
- Supporting PRAs to promote Girlguiding externally
- Increasing confidence, providing learning opportunities and helping build teams of PRAs within counties
- Building positive, supportive relationships with those with communications roles in counties
- Helping counties recruit for communications roles in their local area
- Keeping up to date with county events and communications plans, and coordinating collaboration and storytelling opportunities between both counties and Scottish level
- Building links with lead volunteers focussed on growth, and supporting PRAs to build strong relationships with growth coordinators in their counties

To help achieve this, you'll:

- Meet with your volunteer line manager and staff partner(s) at least once a month. This can be done remotely and will involve discussing how you're getting on, co-ordinating projects, identifying support you need and problem solving
- Keep in regular contact with volunteers and staff you're working with via email. Girlguiding Scotland will provide you with an email address for your use in this role
- Coordinate and chair quarterly online meetings with PRAs and organise and chair additional ad hoc meetings as required
- Gather content for monthly update emails to the PRA network
Post updates to and engage with PRAs in the PRA network Facebook group
- Gather information on county communications and events via the PRA network
- Offer 1:1 support for PRAs via a medium that suits both you and them
- Facilitate in-person sessions at One Team and any other volunteer events where required

1.2 Induction, training, and support

- All volunteers are given an in-depth induction into their role. You'll have the opportunity to learn about Girlguiding Scotland's processes and meet volunteers and staff from across the Scottish team.
- This role receives ongoing staff support from the digital marketing officer and communications officer, and volunteer line manager support from the lead volunteer for membership engagement and communication.
- You'll use our volunteer-staff protocol to support your collaboration with staff. This provides a framework and guidance for working together.
- Expenses for travel and subsistence may be claimed for any costs required to complete your role.

1.3 Your profile

Any member of Girlguiding Scotland aged 18+ can apply for this role. Our lead volunteers should be as diverse as the girls that we support and inspire which is why we encourage applications from people of all backgrounds. In particular, we would welcome applications from disabled people and individuals from ethnic minority groups.

The key skills and attributes we're looking for in our PRA network co-ordinator are:

- Approachable, creative, open minded and flexible
- Willing to support the mission and objectives of Girlguiding Scotland
- Passionate about promoting Girlguiding Scotland
- Be able to communicate with a wide range of volunteers
- Be able to work collaboratively with staff

It would be desirable, but not essential, for you to have:

- Knowledge of the role of county communications and PR advisers

- An understanding of/previous experience working with communications
- Good organisational skills
- An ability to lead, motivate and work as part of a team
- Great communication and interpersonal skills

1.5 How to apply

To apply for this role, email sarahr@girlguiding-scot.org.uk with "PRA network coordinator," in the subject of the email by 11.50pm Sunday 8 March.

Your email must include:

- Your full name
- Your membership number
- Contact information for 2 referees. These should be current members of Girlguiding who are not related to you. Ideally at least one of the referees will be from a level above you, for example your local or county commissioner.
- Your responses to the following 2 questions:

Q1. Why are you interested in this role? (300 words max)

Q2. How would you use your skills and experiences to support the PRA network? (300 words max)

Emailed applications will be reviewed and candidates progressing will be invited to an informal online interview.
